A few words of wisdom. . .



Dan Reynolds with Rick Hafele

During 2007 we were fortunate to have some excellent fly fishermen as guest speakers. Many shared their knowledge of tactics, fish behavior and places with us. Here are a few ideas you might want to consider in 2008 to enhance your love of the sport.

From Rick Hafele, author and biologist:

When you fish rivers take along a collection net and a white tray or jar lid. Kick up some of the bottom, collect specimens in the net and spend 20 or 30 minutes studying them in the collection tray. You'll answer a lot of questions about what nymphs the fish are eating including size, color and behavior. (For a more detailed description of sampling tools, techniques and cautions read Chapter 4 "Selecting The Right Pattern" in Rick's excellent book Nymph Fishing Rivers And Streams.)

Whether you're on a river, stream or lake, the best places to fish will generally be the "edges." Edges in current speed, edges of

plant beds, shoals, depths, substrates, banks. . . Look for the edges.

Calibaetis is the most important mayfly in most lakes.

Don't chase fish in lakes, let them come to you.

Dave Hughes snags bottom all the time. That's why he catches so many fish.

Blue damsels are the males, brown are the females. Fish damselfly nymphs a foot under the water. The strike comes as they sink. Fish around cattails and lily pads.

From Dana Bottcher, Deschutes and Methow guide and owner of Swiftwater Sports:

You can wade fish the Deschutes. From the campground at Heritage Landing, hike up either side of the river for three miles.

Except for a mile or two, all land on the Deschutes is public from Macks Canyon down.

May is the prime time for trout on the Deschutes. Major salmon fly hatches.

From Troy Dettman, international guide, Peninsula steelhead expert:

Spey casting for steelhead in our area began around 1992. Then, people asked "What are you fishing with, a pole vault?" Now all I see are people with two-handed rods. Anywhere I go, Madison, Grande Ronde, you name it, it's spey casting. It makes sense when you're backed up against the bank.

Chucker hunting in waders is a good weight management program.

The best fishing in Botswana is in July.

Phillipsburg, Montana. Rock Creek. Salmon fly hatch in late May, early June. Memorable.

Bass are the hardest fighting fish I've ever caught in fresh water on poppers..
