As many of us know, the Western Rivers Conservancy has played a major role in preserving a large number of pristine wilderness, and threatened, areas throughout the United State. They do it in the most practical way possible. They buy them.

As Director of Major Gifts, Bob Elder plays a vital role in generating the donations that make the WRC's work possible.

"We work with willing land owners and we don't try to manage the lands we acquire from far away," says Elder. "We convey the land to the best stewards.

The Hoh River Trust and its Director Phil Davis are one of those "best stewards." The Trust now manages

70 percent of the Hoh Valley from the border of Olympic National Park to the Pacific Ocean. That amounts to 7,000 acres. 400 acres at the mouth of the Hoh are owned by the Hoh Tribe. The remaining land is privately held.

"The Hoh gives us a unique opportunity to protect a major river

from its source to the sea," says Davis.

**In 60 years he hope the entire Hoh Valley, from the tribal lands up to the park will be under the stewardship of the Trust. "I won't be here to see it, but my grandchildren will. And imagine if we fast forward 200 years. Think about what a great gift we are preserving for generations to come."**

Davis gave each OFF member a copy of *Fast Moving Water*, a beautifully produced book of essays and photographs that gives reader an insight into why the Hoh River Valley evokes such passion among so many people with such diverse background. ## Sport fishing is big business. So lets cut back on stocking.

*(Editors note: Walt Wojcik sent along the 2008 Economic Analysis of the Non-Treaty Commercial and Recreational Fisheries in Washington State. Here are a few facts that might interest you.)*

Recreational anglers in Washington State spent an estimated \$904.8 million in 2006: \$354.9 million on trips, food, lodging and transportation and about \$549.9 million on equipment.

Commercial and recreational fishing directly and

indirectly supported an estimated 16,374 jobs and \$540 million in personal income in 2006. Recreational fishing accounted for more than 12,850 of those jobs. State residents accounted for more than 90 percent of the spending that supports these jobs.

Trout fishing was the most popular at 48% of all angler days, followed by salmon (23%), steelhead (12%), and black bass (12%).

So of course it makes sense to forget trout stocks and spend our license fee revenues on salmon enhancement in Puget Sound. Sounds logical to me. DS
